

Lose Weight - but NOT Breakfast, Part 2



The principle investigator of AHS-2 (Adventist Health Study-2), Hana Kahleovo, MD, says these findings (see Part 1 in the last Dispatch) could be combined into a very practical weight-management strategy for relatively healthy individuals. She recommends skipping supper, avoiding snacks, eating a substantial breakfast, and fasting at least 18 hours per day.

We may not like the idea of going to bed on an empty stomach - many people are used to retiring with very full stomachs! Evidence in animal studies points to a longer life-span and positive influences on glucose tolerance, insulin sensitivity, and the incidence of type 2 diabetes when evening meals are skipped.5

Most of us are acquainted with the old adage, "Eat breakfast like a king, lunch like a prince, and dinner like a pauper." For years, nutritionists have urged us to make breakfast the largest meal of the day - containing at least 25 to 40 percent of the daily calories. Yet, evidence from large-scale surveys in the United States reveals that 18 to 25 percent of adults and as many as 36 percent of adolescents skip this most important meal.6

Breakfast foods vary by culture. One culture often can't even contemplate eating what another relishes first thing in the morning! Yet within cultures, there is a surprising amount of consistency in terms of the kinds of foods consumed at the start of the day. (To be continued.)

Students Participate in Christian Art Show

For the past eleven years, DAA art students have been participating in a Christian art symposium in Bismarck. The symposium focuses on a professional and student Christ-centered visual art show and usually spans four days. Workshops or seminars are part of the show when students and adults may experience creating something visual that has a spiritual application or lesson. Dakota Adventist Academy (DAA) students have attended these seminars when the timing fits into DAA's schedule and have also attended the show as a Sabbath afternoon activity.

This year the focus of the Artists Celebrating Christ weekend was students only with seminars and a student art show. Approximately 200 art pieces were in the show with DAA students showing nine works. Fourteen DAA students attended the Friday afternoon painting seminar, saw the show, voted for People's Choice Award in different grade categories, and observed demonstrations of pysanky (Ukrainian egg dying), iconography (religious paintings in Russian Orthodox Medieval tradition) and portrait painting.

In addition to this major art show, DAA students will be exhibiting in two more shows this year: the Hazen Community Art Association Show in April and the Bismarck Art and Gallery Association show, a juried high school exhibit, during May.

DAA offers a four-year program in art, which can culminate in an "Enriched Diploma in Visual Art" and a portfolio needed for entrance into an art school. Mr. Gary Way, English and art teacher, provides DAA students an excellent experience in learning and enjoying art.
