His wings were still folded against his sides as though he were singing from a limb and not falling, accelerating thirty-two feet per second per second through empty air. Just a breath before he would have been dashed to the ground, he unfurled his wings with exact, deliberate care, revealing the broad bars of white, spread his elegant, white-banded tail, and so floated onto the grass.

She concludes, "beauty and grace are performed whether or not we will sense them. The least we can do is try to be there."

Adam and Eve were there, eyewitnesses to God's beauty and grace revealed every day in their environment. God wants us to be there too. By experienceing the wonders of creation we can reconnect to our Creator and live a life permeated with marvels.

South Dakota Students Receive Scholarships

Two years ago Plainview Academy alumni voted to establish a scholarship program for South Dakota students. To qualify for the scholarship students are required to have their church home be in South Dakota, maintain a grade point average of 2.5 or greater, and maintain a good citizenship standing.

This is the second year of the program. Recipients are Jadyn Anderson, junior from Summit; Nina Faith, sophomore from Huron; Hayden Gronau, junior from Langford; Wesley Kayser, freshman from Aberdeen; and Karissa Rickard, junior from Sioux Falls. The students will receive \$400 towards their education at Dakota Adventist Academy.

The scholarship was started with a donation of \$10,851.79 from the PVA alumni and, thanks to the generosity of Plainview alumni; an additional \$5,625 has been received in contributions since November 2016. The first year \$1500 was awarded to South Dakota students. This year \$2000 was available to be awarded to South Dakota students.

Mix dry ingredients together:

- 8 cups oats
- 4 cups Wheaties
- 4 cups sliced almonds
- 4 cups pecans
- 4 cups coconut
- 1/2 cup wheat germ
- 4 teaspoons sesame seeds

Mix wet ingredients together and pour over dry ingredients:

- 4 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 cup melted butter or margarine
- 1 cup maple syrup
- 2/3 cup honey

Bake on cookie sheets at 300° for 20 or 30 minutes, until edges brown. Stir every 10 minutes. Do not overcook, should be clumpy. Cool and store in airtight container.


