General Information of the Chamberlain Sanitarium and Hospital

"The institution contains well equipped departments for the administration of Hydrotherapy, Phototherapy, Massage, X-ray, High frequency, Galvanic, Faradic and sinusoidal currents; a thoroughly equipped modern surgical department with resident surgeons of long experience and established reputation. A social, homelike; unconventional spirit is maintained. Only such workers are retained in the Institution as are inspired with the spirit of service instead of mercenary motives.

"The Chamberlain Sanitarium Nurses Training School is organized along the lines recognized by the New York State Board of Regents which makes the training equal to the best anywhere in the world. Work Continues at DAA

Halls in the girls' dorm have been painted and damaged ceiling tiles in both dorms are being replaced along with new lights for the hallways.

Registration for the 2018 - 2019 school year is scheduled for August 19. A recent report from recruiter Tracy Peterson indicates that enrollment will be up this next year to approximately 45. Beaver Lake State Park Outing



A park board of eighteen members dedicated Beaver Lake State Park July 24, 1932. A plaque is affixed to a local stone monument in remembrance. Adventists have been enjoying, picnicking and baptizing there for almost as long. Lyle Miller says, "I have been coming to Beaver Lake for 50 years. One year it was 100 degrees." June 30, 2018, when the Edgeley, Kulm and Lehr churches congregated, it was threatening to rain and quite cool.

The numbers were smaller than usual, whether due to the weather or prior commitments, but the fellowship was as sweet. Sandy Werth provided the Sabbath School Superintendent's remarks with a poem about what is chosen most frequently, the Bible or the [TV Guide](#). Jim Cook led the lesson discussion and Becky Miller accompanied the musical numbers on her keyboard. Elder Bob Forbes was the presiding elder and Elder Neil Biloff spoke of *Food Wars*.

After the fellowship meal, there was a discussion about trying to meet again in "the valley" the following year. That is a location with a closer view of the lake and tiered grass seating. The obstacle would be transporting those who might have difficulty walking from the road. Automobiles are forbidden in the valley. There is no shelter but picnic tables grace the upper levels.

Becky Miller is in contact with the new ranger supervisor requesting permission to transport if necessary.

"When we first came here, we (Adventists) were the only ones here. Now the camp is full," says Becky Miller. Indeed, even in "the valley" there was a boy fishing.
